

2. Bylaws The bylaws of a corporation The bylaws of a corporation

Changes to Bylaws and Standing Rules

Bylaws are the rules adopted by your club to provide a framework for its operation. As times change, your bylaws need to change. Bylaws can be changed at any time in the club year provided a 30-day written notice is given to the membership. Because we are living in changing times, now might be a good time to review your bylaws and make changes.

- **1. Quorum.** Is your club quorum realistic? Are you having trouble making a quorum at a meeting? Remember you need meet the present quorum in order to change the bylaw. If you feel you might not make a quorum, take time to call absent members are ask them to attend.
- **2. Meetings.** Most clubs do not have any mention in their bylaws concerning electronic meetings. The Ebell Club of Irvine added this phrase to their bylaws: In the case of a national or state emergency or any type of event that could potentially put members in danger, the President, with the consent of the majority of the Executive Board, ,may order an electronic meeting be held as a substitute for a club or Executive Board Meeting. Remember at the end of this pandemic, you will need to go back and ratify all the work you have done by electronic meetings since you did not have a provision in your bylaws on electronic meetings.
- **3. Elections.** Who knows where we will be in the Spring? Now is the time to plan in case your club cannot meet for elections. I would recommend adding a bylaw concerning holding an election by mail (in case of an emergency) since this will reach all your members. The details of how you would hold the election would be in your standing rules i.e. Who makes the ballots, who counts the ballots, etc. Again, the election committee needs to receive enough ballots to make the club quorum.
- **4. Out-dated Bylaws.** Are you having trouble filling your officer positions? Maybe the responsibilities of the positions need to be up-dated and changed. Maybe the club needs to take one position and make it into two positions. The opposite is also true. Drop officer positions if no one wants to do that job and divide the responsibilities among the other officer positions. Please take out any mention of voting on new members. This can only cause the club trouble especially if a new member is refused membership.

Education projects:

- Ask local schools what special equipment or materials you can donate that students/teachers need these days for virtual or physical learning/teaching.

- Become a physical/virtual tutor to help students with homework.

Cuddle Quilts for Human Options

Club members began the cuddle quilt sewing project 10 years ago to provide a homemade quilt for a child who has left home with a parent fleeing from domestic violence and seeking shelter and help from Human Options. The club provides the financial resources, and the members provide the loving hands to complete each quilt. In 2016, four members have machine sewn and donated 20 quilts; a finished cuddle quilt measures 36 inches by 48 inches. Step one is shopping for coordinating fabrics, thread, and batting to create each unique quilt. Some cuddle quilts are designed with very young children in mind, while others would suit an elementary school aged child or a teen. This year, thanks to our eagle-eyed sale shoppers and using left-overs from one quilt to fill out another quilt's design, only \$230 has been spent on sewing materials to produce the 20 quilts. Our four members have put in a total of 300 hours in 2016.

ZOOM: You DO NOT need the Zoom app, or a Zoom account to play. You DO need a computer,


